A pocket guide for young sky-watchers

3 things real UFO investigators check first

When you see something strange in the sky, real investigators don't jump to conclusions — they check the facts first. Here's what they look for:

- 1. Time of day & light** — Was it near sunrise/sunset? Low sunlight on planes or balloons can look strange and glowing.
- 2. Direction & speed of movement** — Did it move in a straight line at a steady speed (likely a plane or satellite) or did it dart, hover, or change direction fast?
- 3. Other witnesses** — Did anyone else see it too? Multiple witnesses from different spots make a sighting much more interesting to investigators.

Satellite, plane, or something else?

	Blinking lights	Speed	Sound	Altitude
Airplane	Yes, red/white, steady blink	Fast, steady	Engine hum/roar	Usually visible trail
Satellite	Steady, no blinking	Very slow, constant	Silent	Very high, tiny dot
Drone	Fast blinking, various colors	Slow, can hover	Buzzing	Low
Unexplained	Irregular or none	Sudden changes, no trail	Often silent	Varies
